KENTUCKIANA HERBAL THYMES

Parsley is the most frequently used herb in Italy. Here is a nice variation on traditional Basil Pesto.

Using a food processor, blend together the following: 3 cups loosely packed fresh parsley, 2 cloves garlic, chopped; 1/2 cup olive oil; 2 heaping

tablespoons nuts (walnuts or pine nuts);

1/4 cup freshly grated parmesan cheese.

It freezes well in ice cube trays. If freezing, you can leave out the cheese until ready to use. Thaw the pesto and blend in the grated cheese. I usually forget to do this and go ahead and put the cheese in before freezing without any ill effects. Yields about 14 TBS

<u>August Chicken Salad</u>

HSA Website

- 4 boneless chicken breasts
- 3 ripe peaches
- 3 ripe tomatoes
- 2 cucumbers

- 4 Tbsp. olive oil 3 Tbsp. white wine vinegar 4 Tbsp. Dijon honey mustard
- 1 Tbsp. fresh thyme leaves

3 peppermint leaves, chopped Baby spinach, as a bed 1/4 tsp. sea salt Cracked black pepper to taste

Coat chicken breasts with half the thyme leaves and grill until cooked through, about 20-25 minutes. Remove to a cutting board to cool. When cool, cut into ³/₄-inch chunks. While the chicken is cooking, clean and chop the peaches, tomatoes, and cucumbers. Put into a large bowl for mixing. In a small bowl, combine olive oil, vinegar, and mustard. When fully blended, add the remaining thyme and the peppermint. Stir until uniform. Retain 2 tablespoons for later use. Add chicken to the fruit mixture, sprinkle with the remaining dressing and gently toss until mixture is evenly coated. Refrigerate 1 hour, or overnight. Form a bed of cleaned baby spinach leaves in a serving bowl; add the salad mixture, season with cracked black pepper and sea salt, and drizzle with the reserved 2 tablespoons of dressing. Garnish with pansies or nasturtiums.
